Nesting Plans for Selected Bird Species


These measurements are internal, so the thickness of the boards will need to be added as necessary. With enclosed boxes the diameter of the entrance is crucial for keeping house sparrows and starlings out. Even the largest birds need entrance holes small enough to keep cats and raccoons out. Allow 2 inches between the entrance hole and the roof (Burton, 1999).









Open-Fronted Nestboxes and Shelves
